Pastor's Note

It is hard for us to imagine just how much we are loved by God. Still in the Easter Season, we have the prominence of the Passion and Resurrection in our minds and hearts. Through the crucified Lord we can see the immeasurable extent of the Trinity's love and with the Resurrection, we can understand its permanence, its eternity. Christ has "cleared the road" for us to have access to eternal life. The life of heaven or eternal life is the divine communion of life and love through the glorified humanity of the Risen Lord. Humanity, as the sisters and brothers of the Risen Christ, is brought into the relationship of the Father with the Son. And the Father breathes or sighs his love of the Son and now, of us. How incredible! Yet, we are given a foretaste of this love in our lives now. We do not have to remain utterly ignorant of the Father's love until, God willing, the life of heaven. In the Second Reading from the *Book of Revelation*, Saint John sees something beautiful in his vision.

St. John sees the new Jerusalem coming down from heaven. He then hears a loud voice, "See, the home of God is among humans. He will dwell with them as their

God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes." Throughout the Gospels we hear stories of Jesus visiting different homes and, especially, joining a group at table for a meal. Often, those at the table were not the "best sorts." He frequently associated himself with people judged as "sinners." Such table fellowship was meant to convey a meaning – it was a gesture of acceptance by the Lord to those with him. It is one thing to be an invited guest but is another thing to be the host. Being a host can trigger our insecurities, heighten our vulnerabilities. It puts stress on our fear of acceptance. By making his dwelling with us, by living among us God communicates a profound love. We are loved not only when sinfulness is washed away with salvation and the Beatific Vision. But we are loved even now, loved with the same love of heaven. Remember, within our imperfect lives and imperfect faith, he "will dwell with them as their God." Our life as Christians is a life of communion with him, or life and love.

The parish offers different opportunities throughout the year to grow in love and keep Christ at the center of our lives. To See, To Love, To Serve, encourages us all to keep the fire of discipleship growing through the deepening of our understanding, our prayer and our serving. Our Bulletin offers a four-week cycle exploring a different aspect of Catholic Faith through the lens of Seeing, Loving and Serving. This week, we look at the Sacred Heart of Jesus by looking at the teaching of Pope Francis.

The last Encyclical (a Papal letter written by the Pope to the entire Catholic Church) from Pope Francis was called *Dilexit nos* - He Loved Us, released October 24, 2024. In the Encyclical, Pope Francis focused on the intense love of the Heart of Jesus, exploring the inseparable relationship between divine love and human love. The encyclical seeks to deepen the Church's understanding of how Christ's Sacred Heart reflects the boundless love of God and is the perfect model of human love. Here are some of the key themes of the encyclical:

1. The Heart of Jesus as the Symbol of Divine Love: Pope Francis emphasizes that the Sacred Heart of Jesus represents God's unconditional and merciful love for humanity. Jesus, in His human nature, reveals the divine love that seeks the salvation and well-being of every person, offering a visible and tangible expression of God's infinite compassion.

2. The Integration of Divine and Human Love: The encyclical underscores the unity of divine love with human love in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus' heart shows how human emotions and affections can be sanctified by divine grace. His love for others, particularly the marginalized, reflects the depths of God's love, and human love is lifted to a higher, more perfect expression through His example.

3. The Call to Imitate Christ's Love: Pope Francis highlights that Christians are called to imitate the love of the Heart of Jesus in their own lives. This means cultivating a love that is both sacrificial and selfless, attentive to the needs of others, especially the poor and suffering. The encyclical encourages the faithful to look to the Heart of Christ as a model for personal and communal love.

4. The Heart of Jesus as a Source of Hope and Healing: The document also speaks about the wounded nature of human love in a broken world. The Heart of Jesus, pierced by the sins of humanity, remains a source of hope and healing for all. Through His Sacred Heart, Christ offers forgiveness, renewal, and the possibility of redemption for all who turn to Him.

5. Mercy and Compassion at the Core of Christian Mission: Pope Francis places particular emphasis on the merciful love that flows from the Sacred Heart as central to the mission of the Church. Christians are called to be ambassadors of this love, bringing Christ's mercy to the world through acts of compassion, justice, and reconciliation.

6. Contemplation and Devotion to the Sacred Heart: The encyclical encourages the faithful to develop a deeper devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Pope Francis calls for moments of prayer, reflection, and meditation on this divine-human love as a way of drawing closer to the heart of God and allowing His love to transform the world.

To sum up, the encyclical *Dilexit nos* invites believers to a greater understanding and imitation of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, portraying it as the ultimate example of how divine love can elevate and perfect human love, with a particular focus on mercy, compassion, and healing. It is both a theological reflection and a pastoral call to live out the love of Christ in daily life.
