Pastor's Note

The Risen Lord told his disciples that he would be leaving them soon (the Ascension) but would send them a helper (Pentecost). And we will be better off! This has always seemed confusing. Wouldn't it have been better if the Lord remained with us? Who wouldn't prefer to have sat and listen to him preach by the shores of the Sea of Galilee or witnessed a miracle in Judea? The answer seems clear and easy – Of course it would be better. Yet, Christ teaches the opposite. He must be right, and I must be wrong. How are we better off with his Ascension?

A beautiful manifestation of love is a parent's care for their child. When a child is young, the parent takes care of everything. Be it in the home or in the world, the parent assumes an absolute responsibility. While all admire the "doting parent," at some point, as the child ages, it seems that the parent must give the child more freedom to stand on their own two feet without being held up by mom or dad. This doesn't mean that the parent loves the child less. Rather, it reflects a deepening love of wanting what is best for the growth and maturation of their child. Who can forget the sense of accomplishment of riding a bike without training wheels or dad running beside us holding us up? Or when

we cut the grass all by ourselves for the first time? Graduating high school, college or university? In a strange way, it seems that to love one's child also entails to let go. This letting go is a difficult act of selfless love. It is done exclusively for the good of the child. With this understanding, we can better grasp the Ascension.

When the Lord told his disciples, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." No longer will the disciples be mainly observers and listeners. God's actions convey a knowledge and trust of the disciples and us. He calls and sends us. The Son has shared his mission, the mission received from the Father. The Lord moves our faith from the outside to the inside; our faith is written on our hearts. We may have our doubts of his call and choice, "How could you want me?" But he is the Lord God and makes no mistakes. In love he has given us himself and a share in his work. You are known and trusted by God and so, called to go "to the ends of the earth."

The parish offers different opportunities throughout the year to grow in love and keep Christ at the center of our lives. To See, To Love, To Serve, encourages us all to keep the fire of discipleship growing through the deepening of our understanding, our prayer and our serving. Our Bulletin offers a four-week cycle exploring a different aspect of Catholic Faith through the lens of Seeing, Loving and Serving. This week, we look at the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in service.



A Love That Gives Itself as Drink

In the Encyclical *Dilexit nos* (He loved Us) Pope Francis draws us into the rich biblical and theological imagery of water as a symbol of life, salvation, and love, all fulfilled in the pierced heart of Christ: “The pierced heart of Christ embodies all God’s declarations of love present in the Scriptures. That love is no mere matter of words; rather, the open side of his Son is a source of life for those whom he loves, the fount that quenches the thirst of his people” (#101). The Pope traces the development of the Sacred Heart devotion from the early Church Fathers to the medieval who saw the pierced side of Christ as the source of grace. Over time, this devotion became a personal, intimate encounter with Christ’s love, especially through figures like St. Margaret Mary Alacoque and St. Thérèse of Lisieux: “As for me, I find perfection very easy to practise because I have understood it is a matter of taking hold of Jesus by his heart” (St. Thérèse). The Pope concludes this section with a powerful call to console Christ’s wounded

wounded heart. Drawing from the reflections of St. Claude de la Colombière and Pope Pius XI, Pope Francis explains how this desire to offer reparation for the sins of the world heals not only Christ’s heart but also the hearts of those who engage in it. The goal is not guilt but a deep, purifying sorrow for sin, which brings about spiritual renewal and peace (#152-163).

In this light, service is to be understood as an act of love, and indeed compassion, for the One who has given us everything through himself. It is a gift of our return for the love we have been shown.
