Pastor's Note

I read recently something Saint Augustine wrote. Augustine spoke of how our creation, and all that is, was from nothing. God created the universe and humanity *ex nihilo*. Consequently, he reasoned that within the human heart or spirit, we are haunted by the shadow of nothingness. The prospect of “nothingness” is painful and engenders fear. Therefore, we look to other created things to fill the void or emptiness. Of course, this doesn’t work. It may provide a short reprieve, but in the end, we continue to look, to search for that which always fills. There is only one who is untouched by the shadow of nothingness, that is, only one who can fill our hearts. And that is God.

This week we celebrate a great solemnity – *Corpus Christi*, or the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. I once heard a bishop describe his first experience of giving Communion during Mass at St. Peter’s Basilica in Rome. He said he was surprised with the lack of organization. Those assisting with Communion were not told or shown where to go. Rather, they simply waded into the crowd. As he was giving Communion among the crowd, he said he could hear people trying to get his attention. They pleaded, “*Per favore, padre.*” Upon reflection, the bishop thought that their words and feelings were exactly correct. They pleaded not only because they wanted something but also, they needed something. They and we both want and need the Sacrament of the Eucharist. At the elevation of the Eucharist during Mass, when the priest says, “Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.” I am amazed and deeply consoled by God’s limitless love and mercy. In the face of my imperfect faith and life, God offers himself as the sacrifice once for all. He gives himself to us. He shows a faithful mercy and a doggedness that refuses not to love, no matter the cost.

Indeed, on *Corpus Christi* we plead, “*Per favore, padre.*” Deep within our hearts, we are unconsciously haunted by the shadow of nothingness. Today, we are given not a temporary reprieve, but the discovery of the “pearl of great value.” We are given infinite, eternal mercy and love. And our souls “shall be healed.”

To Serve

The parish offers different opportunities throughout the year to grow in love and keep Christ at the center of our lives. To See, To Love, To Serve, encourages us all to keep the fire of discipleship growing through the deepening of our understanding, our prayer and our serving. This week, we look at what it means to live sacramentally by considering the relationship between the sacraments, faith and the Church..

At the heart of the sacraments is God's love, fully revealed to us in Jesus Christ. In the Sacraments, Christ makes Himself present as the one who faithfully loves us by giving his whole self to us. In each Sacrament, He says: "I love you; I have given my life for you, and I want to love you now and always. Will you let me love you?" The Sacraments presuppose a living relationship of love between God and us. The sacraments also presuppose faith, a faith by which we come to know, to trust and to believe in the love God has for us.

The faith we bring to the sacraments is like the hemorrhaging woman in the gospels. She was desperate, because she had spent all of her money, yet no doctor had been able to heal her. Her future could only be resignation to inevitable suffering and isolation. Hearing about Jesus' miracles, she found new hope—hope in God. Knowing where to find Jesus, she left her home, thinking: "If I but touch his clothes, I shall be cured" (Mk 5:28). She did, and she was healed. "Jesus, aware at once that power had gone out from him, turned around in the crowd and asked, 'Who has touched my clothes?'" Then he said: "Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be cured of your affliction" (Mk 5:30, 34).

By reaching out in faith, the woman in the gospel encountered Jesus and experienced his mercy and healing. But notice the movement – it is her faith that reaches out to touch the Lord. Jesus wants to be touched by our faith! In the sacraments, He responds by filling us with His love. In the Sacraments, Jesus dispenses the saving power of His love to those who approach Him in faith, fully aware of their great need, and especially of His great love.

The Catechism of the Church says that "Faith is first of all a personal adherence of the person to God." The sacraments of the Church extend through time the works of Christ during his earthly life. The healing power that emanates from the Body of Christ, which is the Church, is actualized in the sacraments, to heal the wound of sin and give new life in Christ.

May the Sacraments move us in faith to love and serve.

Loving Father,

Open our hearts to hidden realities:
your love for all people,
your presence in the community,
your call to justice and peace.

May the sacraments stir in us
that same love for those with whom we worship
and all members of our human family.

Christ Jesus,

Help us to imitate your example:
healing the sick,
welcoming the stranger,
assisting the poor and vulnerable.

May the sacraments remind us
of your love and self-giving,
which we strive to imitate.

Holy Spirit,

Make visible to our eyes what is invisible:
your call to your people,
your summons to live our faith daily
as witnesses of justice and peace.

May the sacraments move us
to engage in love-inspired action
that transforms us and the world.

Amen.
