Pastor's Note

I rarely gave much thought to God the Holy Spirit until the past ten years or so. I never prayed to the Spirit. The Holy Spirit's place in my faith was essentially relegated to my making the Sign of the Cross. More recently, I encountered a Charismatic Prayer group at the Jesuit parish in Toronto and intentionally tried to incorporate praying to three Persons of the Trinity. It may not have felt too natural at the beginning, but I have come to realize that the Holy Spirit gives refreshment and freshness to one's heart and soul.

In our psalm for this week's Mass, we hear the psalmist asking God to "send forth your Spirit and renew the face of the earth." The Spirit is perfect eternal love. It is the love shared between the Father and the Son within the Holy Trinity. This perfect eternal love, the Spirit, connects the Father and the Son. When we receive the Spirit at baptism and its deepening at Confirmation, we are given a participation with the Spirit. That is, we are given the Trinity's perfect eternal love. The Holy Spirit draws our hearts toward God. From the Spirit's love, our hearts make more room for the life of Jesus Christ. The Spirit's unseen labour deepens the desire for Christ's life to fill our life. The Spirit's unseen labour fills, renews and refreshes our hearts. Saint Paul writes, "in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body - Jews or Greeks, slaves or free - and we were all made to drink of one Spirit." We have all been given perfect eternal love because we are not merely creatures, a cluster of cells or an anonymous being. We are the children of the Father in which he has chosen to dwell and live. "I rejoice in the Lord."

To Serve

The parish offers different opportunities throughout the year to grow in love and keep Christ at the center of our lives. To See, To Love, To Serve, encourages us all to keep the fire of discipleship growing through the deepening of our understanding, our prayer and our serving. Our Bulletin offers a four-week cycle exploring a different aspect of Catholic Faith through the lens of Seeing, Loving and Serving. This week, we look at the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus through the saints.

“I need nothing but God, and to lose myself in the Heart of Jesus.”

Through the centuries, many saints have shown a deep love and dedication to the Sacred Heart. But it was Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, a young French Visitation nun, who is widely known for receiving visions of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, which led to the widespread devotion we know today. She is seen as the patron saint of the devotion to the Sacred Heart and by the title promised to her by Jesus: “well-beloved disciple of My Sacred Heart.” Her story continues to demonstrate how God uses the humblest among human beings for the greatest of purposes.

Margaret was born in 1647. She was part of a large Catholic family, the fifth of seven children. From an early age, Margaret showed a great devotion to Christ, especially to the Blessed Sacrament. At the age of 15 she became bedridden by a mysterious illness. Margaret prayed to the Blessed Mother, promising in front of her whole family that if she was healed, she would take religious vows. She was instantly cured. At the age of 23 she entered the Order of the Visitation at Paray-le-Monial and it was here that the Lord Jesus appeared to her on three separate occasions to impart to her the mission of spreading the devotion to his Sacred Heart.

Although initially filled with fears of her own unworthiness for such a task, Margaret received consolation in his words: “Fear nothing; I shall be thy strength.”

In the first apparition, Jesus showed her his flaming heart and told her that he could no longer contain his burning love. He wanted to pour it out on all of humanity, and she was to spread this message to the world.

In the second apparition, Jesus instructed Margaret to devote the first Friday of every month to his Sacred Heart and to pray

for an hour between 11pm and midnight every Thursday. These two practices – the First Friday devotion and Holy Hour—have since become widely popular among Catholics.

The Final apparition took place during the octave of Corpus Christi. Jesus asked Margaret to establish a feast dedicated to his Sacred Heart on the first Friday after the octave.

St Claude de la Colombière, a Jesuit priest, served as St. Margaret Mary’s spiritual director and played a vital role in supporting her visions and promoting the devotion to the Sacred Heart. However, Margaret’s superiors were initially skeptical of her revelations, but when she again fell mysteriously ill and the doctor could find no remedy, her mother superior suggested that Margaret pray to God for healing. If the prayer was granted, it would be a sign of the truthfulness of her claims. Margaret did as she was told, and, again, she was immediately healed.

Margaret worked hard to spread the devotion saying: “It seems to me that I can breathe only to increase devotion to the Sacred Heart.” She and some of the Visitation sisters produced and distributed an image of the Sacred Heart and various small devotional books they had written. Their had considerable success and the demand was everywhere.

Following her death in 1690, the spread of the devotion spread, even outside of France. In 1765 the devotion to the Sacred Heart was officially approved by Rome, and, in 1856, the feast of the Sacred Heart was made a universal solemnity by Pope Pius IX. In 1899, Pope Leo XIII composed an Act of Consecration that dedicated the entire human race to the Sacred Heart.

And so today, over three hundred years after her death, we remember St. Margaret Mary by the title promised to her by Jesus: “Hence thou shalt be called the well-beloved disciple of My Sacred Heart.”
