Pastor's Note:

This week's note was written by Bryan Manning, S.J.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus answers a question that lies deep in every human heart: *Who is my neighbor?* Yet, as always, the Lord takes the question further, not merely identifying the neighbor, but showing us how to *become* one.

A man is left for dead on the road. He is nameless, faceless, stripped of identity. Two religious men, perhaps respected in society, even admired for their piety, see him but pass by. Why? Fear? Ritual purity? Busyness? We don't know. But we do know this: their hearts did not move with compassion.

Then comes the Samaritan, a foreigner, considered impure by Jewish standards. He sees the wounded man and is *moved with pity*. That phrase is key. The Greek word used - *spagchnizomai* - describes a gut-wrenching compassion, the same word used to describe Jesus' own mercy. This is no fleeting emotion. It is love that costs something.

The Samaritan draws near. He touches the wounds. He spends oil and wine. He carries the broken body on his own beast and pays the innkeeper with two denarii, two days' wages. He promises to return. He binds himself to the fate of a stranger.

Jesus ends with a reversal: "Go and do likewise." He shifts the focus. The question is no longer, "Who is my neighbor?" but "To whom will I be a neighbor?" Holiness is not shown in religious titles or external appearances, but in merciful love, concrete, costly, and incarnational.

This parable is not merely a moral tale. It is a window into the very heart of Christ. Jesus Himself is the true Good Samaritan. We are the half-dead, wounded ones, beaten by sin, unable to rise. He did not pass us by. He drew near. He touched our wounds. He carried us on the Cross. He paid the price with His own Blood and left us in the care of the Church, promising to return.

The late and beloved Pope Francis liked to see the church as a "field hospital" that caters to the poor and marginalized. A very hands-on, sleeves rolled up application of our faith, a faith that goes hand in hand with works of justice and mercy. "Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth. (1 John 3:18)." Christ calls us, like the Good Samaritan, to live the Gospel, not merely understand it. In this way, the world will see the face of Christ in us.
