Pastor's Note:

This week's note was written by Bryan Manning, S.J.

In Matthew 12:1-8, we meet Jesus and His disciples walking through grainfields on the Sabbath. The disciples, hungry, begin to pluck heads of grain and eat. The Pharisees pounce: "Look, your disciples are doing what is unlawful on the Sabbath!" But Jesus, as He often does, turns their accusation into a lesson about the heart of God.

Jesus reminds them how David once ate the holy bread when he was in need, though the law reserved it for priests. He points to the priests in the temple who work on the Sabbath and are considered innocent. Then He says something bold: "I desire mercy, not sacrifice." And finally, "The Son of Man is Lord of the Sabbath."

What is Jesus teaching us? At first glance, it seems like a debate about Sabbath law. But deeper down, Jesus is revealing the heart of His Father, a heart that loves mercy more than ritual, love more than legalism.

How often do we fall into the same trap as the Pharisees? We measure ourselves and others by the rules we keep. We take pride in our religious observances. We forget that the heart of our faith is love. Love of God and love of neighbor. The Pharisees were experts in the law, yet they had lost sight of the very God the law was meant to lead them to.

Jesus shows us that God's commands are not meant to crush us but to bring us life. The Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. And mercy, the love that reaches out to the broken, the hungry, the weak, is what pleases God most.

I think this Gospel calls us to examine our own hearts. Are we more concerned with appearances, with checking boxes, with judging others? Or do we have hearts that see the person in front of us, that are moved with compassion?

Jesus desires mercy. He desires hearts open to love, hearts that make space for the hungry disciple, the struggling neighbor, the challenging family member.

And above all, He wants us to know that He Himself is our rest. The Lord of the Sabbath walks with us, feeds us, and shows us the mercy of God. In Him, we find our true peace, not in perfect performance, but in the embrace of His love.

We may ask ourselves in quiet reflection: Lord, what have I done for you? What am I doing for you? What ought I do for you? Amen.
