Pastor's Note:

Saint Ignatius of Loyola was, for a long time, tortured by guilt for the sinfulness of his past life. In his autobiography he recounts how he would go to Confession and confess every sin he could remember, from his childhood to that very moment. When absolved, he felt great consolation. Life seemed more beautiful, every step lighter than before. As he walked to where he was staying, however, he began to doubt. He wondered if he had confessed every sin or had forgotten a few? He debated with himself whether he had felt the proper amount of remorse for this or that sin. The consolation disappeared. He felt he was back to where he started – in need of forgiveness. Ignatius tells us that he would often turn around and go to Confession again. It got so bad that the Confessor had to tell him to stop confessing so often in the same day. The struggle for Ignatius, and perhaps for many of us, is to thoroughly believe in the power of God's mercy (his love), that his mercy is greater than our sin. In truth, so great is God's mercy Saint Paul writes, that God has nailed "it to the Cross."

During the time St. Paul was writing, Jews understood that humanity had incurred an unpayable debt owed to God. Adam acquired the first debt through the Original Sin and, subsequently, humanity has added to it by our sins. The debt seems to be so large that we are rendered stuck, like St. Ignatius – "How could God truly forgive what I have done?" St. Paul describes how God has forgiven. Paul writes, "when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the Cross." Through Jesus Christ, the Father has nailed it to the Cross, thereby, made us "alive together with him." By nailing the now blank record of debt to the Cross, the Father wants all to see and believe – we have been forgiven because we are always loved. God's mercy is eternally powerful. We cannot be separated from him because God will not permit it. As Saint John Chrysostom taught in the fourth century, the "decree of our sins which was against us, he has taken it completely away, nailing it to the cross ... so that no trace of it might remain. This is why he did not erase it but tore it to pieces."
