PASTOR'S NOTE

Living the life of faith can sometimes result in feeling disappointment. Despite firm resolve, one can find oneself continuing to struggle with the same old temptations with which one has struggled for years, even decades. We say our prayers, we make our commitments, we seem to do everything right and, yet, we believe ourselves to be at the exact same spot. So, we recommit, pray harder. Still, the old temptations remain. Disappointment begins to drown our hope and a sense of futility to smother our trust. There can arise the feeling of "What's the point?" At least for myself, when I consider my temptations and sinfulness, I want to be redeemed and redeemed now! The mistake we often make is our usual mistake. Despite best intentions and inspiring commitment, we continue to focus on ourselves rather than God. Our principal concern should not be on what we do or don't do but should be on the Lord Jesus Christ. Our struggle with temptation and sinfulness is really a question of affection, of love. Do I love the Lord more than I love those things, feelings and behaviours I say I want to be free of? Do I have the will to set them down and follow him? Our growing affection and love for Christ is not a sprint, it is more of a marathon.

The Second Reading from the *Letter to the Hebrews* gives us the encouragement to "run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith." My novice master, Fr. Pat, once said to me that, "the life of faith is like a gentle exorcism." We might shudder for a moment to think of oneself as going through an "exorcism." What did Fr. Pat mean? God is infinitely, eternally patient with us. God understands that certain things, feelings and behaviours have long histories with each person. Consequently, it isn't so easy to simply cast them aside. But God's desire and love for each person is experienced by us as his patience. The desire of God is not primarily focused on one's changed behaviour. It is focused on the person. God desires his child. Through Jesus Christ, we are shown God's true face. We are shown his self-giving and self-forgetting love. We may not follow perfectly or as faithfully as we wish, but we're getting there. We may still struggle with the same old temptations and sinfulness – but not as much as we use to. Our "gentle exorcism" is our gradual letting go of disordered things, feelings and behaviours because we want to fill our hands with something else. We want to fully accept and embrace the Father's love. Christ is capturing our hearts. "Let us ... lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely" and let us run the race always "looking to Jesus."
